The Johnson Ohana Charitable Foundation is a non-profit public charity founded in 2008 by Kim and Jack Johnson to promote positive and lasting change within communities by supporting organizations that focus on environmental, art, and music education.

2016 HIGHLIGHTS

In 2016, the Johnson Ohana Charitable Foundation expanded support for healthy oceans and plastic free initiatives. Funding was also directed to farm to school programs and sustainable local food systems, including follow-up support for the Edible Campus Project at UC Santa Barbara, an effort launched in 2015 to build a campus farm and to reconnect the campus with our food system.

In addition to environmental grantmaking, the Johnson Ohana Charitable Foundation supported art and music education for youth, including funding for *Plastic Fantastic?* - a curated exhibit at the Honolulu Museum of Art. Thousands of students and community members toured the exhibit to explore plastic through the lens of art and engaged in hands-on art activities.
